Abyssinian Baptist Church's 21st Pastor Confirmed By Hazel Rosetta Smith

n October 28, 2022, the Abyssinian Baptist Church suffered a deep loss at the passing of its longtime pastor, Reverend Dr. Calvin Otis Butts, III. Dedicated to his faith, Dr. Butts was an advocate for social and racial justice and a guiding light in the village of Harlem

Since that time, throughout the mourning period, Abyssinian's Pulpit Search Committee traversed a difficult path in a process to vet potential applicants of diverse ages and genders for a position that everyone agreed would be a hard act to follow.

The Reverend Dr. Calvin Otis Butts, III had served the Abyssinian Baptist Church in a ministerial capacity for fifty years, beginning as a student at Union Theological Seminary under the very astute then Abyssinian Senior Pastor, the Rev Samuel DeWitt Proctor. Following the passing of Proctor, Dr. Butts began his journey as the Senior Pastor in 1989.

In the book of Jeremiah 3:15, it states, "And I will give you shepherds after my own heart, who will feed you with knowledge and understanding." The question that moved throughout the congregation and community was who would be found that could continue such a profound legacy while building their own?"

After vetting nearly forty interested parties, the Pulpit Search Committee announced their selected candidate was Rev. Dr. Kevin R. Johnson. A candidate meet-greet week was held in person at Abyssinian and by Zoom with officers, ministers, ministries, and members of the church. Challenging questions and in-depth inquiries were presented. Rev. Johnson preached on Pentecost Sunday.

According to the church's bylaws, the Senior Pastor selection is not complete until the congregation has voted to approve the candidate. Churchwide voting was submitted on-

line from June 21 through Sunday, June 23. In-person paper ballot voting took place from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. on June 23rd.

Before the sun had fully descended on the 23rd, ElectionTrust, a professional election company, officially tallied the ballots.

The word went forth, that Rev. Kevin R. Johnson, a Baptist minister for over thirty-three years, the founding Lead Pastor of Dare to Imagine Church, Inc., Philadelphia, was proclaimed to be the Abyssinian Baptist Church's 21st Pastor following the late Rev. Dr. Calvin O. Butts III.

Rev. Johnson joined Abyssinian in 1997. He graduated magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Morehouse College and later received post-graduate degrees at Columbia University and Union Theological Seminary.

He was mentored by the late Rev. Dr. Calvin O. Butts III and served as an intern and Assistant Pastor. Johnson is returning to the Abyssinian Church recognized as having established a ministry that started with twenty people in his home and now boasts a congregation of over 1,500 members on a \$2.2 million campus in the Mt. Airy section of Philadelphia.

Under his leadership, the church donated over \$750,000 to support area organizations that provide services for people in need. He also serves as the founder, president, and CEO of Dare to Imagine Community Development Corporation.

The hope of the voting process was provided by the Pulpit Search Committee as #AbyForward. That desire was similarly expressed by Rev. Johnson in the following message to the Abyssinian congregation.

Abyssinian is not just a church – it is our spiritual home, and I am honored to build upon its rich legacy with you. Together, we will advance God's kingdom, serve our community by His grace,







Education That Lifts Up All of Our Students

s New York City's first openly dyslexic mayor, I know what it is like to not have the support I needed in school growing up. School was often difficult for me. I was scared of being called on by the teacher, and my fellow students made fun of me. I know how important it is that our children have a bright start and the support they need for a bold future.

That is why this administration is investing in upstream solutions in our education system, creating conditions that improve outcomes for all our students. We don't want our children to fall behind because they learn differently; we want them to start out ahead. And this week we are taking another big step forward with two major initiatives: a new vision for special education and a new math curriculum, "NYC Solves."

"NYC Solves," is a major

citywide initiative to make mathematics more accessible for all students — no matter where they go to school or what language they speak at home. This new program will revolutionize how algebra is taught in schools and ensure that all our students have foundational math skills and are being encouraged to excel in mathematics at every level.

We are also creating the Division of Inclusive and Accessible Learning (DIAL), which will be led by a new Deputy Chancellor for Inclusive and Accessible Learning, Christina Foti. This new division will utilize a \$750 million budget and 1,300 staff to focus on supporting multilingual learners and students with disabilities so that, every student can be prepared for a rewarding career and long-term economic security — no matter their background or ability.

These two new initiatives build on the generational investments we have already made in public education.

In just two years, our administration has implemented a major initiative, "NYC Reads," to fundamentally change how students learn to read literacy as the core focus and priority of New York City's public schools. We have also invested over \$600

million to protect critical programs that were funded with temporary stimulus dollars, including arts funding, teacher recruitment efforts, restorative justice programming, computer science programs, "Civics for All," school social workers and psychologists, and much more. Our mandated universal dyslexia screening for all students are helping us get students the support they need early on, and we have created the first-ever public school dedicated to supporting students with dyslexia and related learning disabilities.

We have also provided over 42,000 students with offers for a 3-K seat — an increase of 300 percent in the last five years, and we are continuing to work to ensure that every child who wants an early childhood education seat will have access to one. We have also added 57 Gifted and Talented programs citywide and added over 26,000 classroom seats through major construction and modernization projects. I am also pleased to report that nine new schools will open in the coming school year, including a new high school focused on health care.

And because we know that learning doesn't only take place in the classroom and during the school year, we have expanded popular programs like Summer Rising to bring 110,000 students summer programming. We are committed to helping students enter the workforce with programs like FutureReadyNYC that connect our students to apprenticeships that lead to good-paying careers. This work has resulted in students earning a cumulative \$8.2 million from paid work experiences at top companies over the past two years alone.

Our New York City Public Schools chancellor, David Banks, and I are both graduates of the New York City school system, and we are committed to continuing our city's legacy of excellence in public education. We are not going to allow another Eric to sit in the classroom, hoping not to be called on. We are making sure that every student has access to the support and resources they need. We are lifting our young people, putting them on a pathway to a bright future, and ensuring that our education system remains unmatched anywhere in this nation.



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Home Buying in Harlem Be Prepared to Buy Now

an anyone afford to buy a home in Harlem? The values of Harlem properties are steadily increasing. But for low to moderate income families there may be some help on the horizon. The city is planning some new construction projects within the next few months. These units will be classified as mixed income residences with an 80-20% designation, meaning the 20% will be set aside for low to moderate income families.

The city also has an ambitious plan of renovating several apartment buildings in Harlem and converting them to Housing Development Fund Corporation (HDFC) Cooperative units. Many of these buildings will be in Central Harlem. The income qualification will be between 100–165% area median income (AMI). These limited equity coop units will provide low- and moderate-in-

come families with an opportunity for homeownership when it seemed previously impossible.

How soon before these units are available? Calculate the completion date to be usually somewhere between 2 ½ to 3 years from the time they start the process. Plus, the contractor will be required to secure approvals from various city agencies and the construction financing must be in place before the project can officially start. So, at a minimum time you're looking at somewhere around the year 2025-2026. But when you think of it 2025 is not as far as it seems.

This year is nearly half over. When you think about it, this decade is now almost half over! So, start planning now. By early planning, you can now have time to set a monthly savings goal to increase your savings. You also have time to reduce your monthly credit debt and to improve your credit score. Again, these will be lottery programs, but by doing these necessary preplanning strategies, you are positioning yourself to be approved, if you are selected.

It is estimated about 10,000 households or more will enter the lottery. The process will be

very competitive. You cannot make any mistakes in filling out your application, or you will be disqualified. You must have your application postmarked by the deadline. You want to give yourself every opportunity to take advantage of these programs. Some properties are now listed on 'housing connect' go to nyc.gov/HPD website.

The lottery is not a sure thing, but the beauty of the lottery program is that the properties are subsidized and so you will have a significant amount of equity just by completing the purchase. Plus, with condominiums, single and multi-family homes, usually the city will give you a tax abatement for a substantial number of years, which is another advantage for a first-time home buyer. With home values on the rise, the New York City Housing lotteries programs are becoming more important in creating stability within our communities.





Michael Jackson's Legacy: Fifteen Years After His Death, His Influence Continues By Stacy M. Brown | NNPA Newswire Senior National Correspondent

In what may have Jackson's solo career, tween 2021 and 2023. been his greatest Ltriumph, a very frail and emotionally tested Michael Jackson walked out of a Santa Maria, Calif., courthouse on a sunny June day in 2005, having beaten 13 charges related to allegedly molesting a young cancer patient.

Unfortunately, almost four years later, Jackson died of an overdose of the sedative propofol. He was 50, and a stunned world couldn't conceive that it had lost the biggest pop music entertainer ever to grace the planet. At the time of his death, he was rehearsing for a series of London concerts aimed at reviving a career shattered by allegations, wild spending habits, and strange bedfellows. A Los Angeles court sentenced Dr. Conrad Murray, who was Michael Jackson's personal doctor at the time of the singer's death in 2009, to four years in prison for involuntary manslaughter in 2011.

Michael Jackson's rise to fame began early. He was the seventh of nine children. Born on August 29, 1958, in Gary, Indiana, Jackson joined his brothers Jackie, Tito, Jermaine, and Marlon to form The Jackson Five, a group that quickly rose to stardom, mand streams be-

launched in the 1970s, reached unprecedented heights with the release of "Thriller" in 1982. The album became the best-selling of all time, with over 21 million copies sold in the United States and at least 27 million worldwide, cementing Jackson's place as a global icon.

However, Jackson's life was not without its challenges. His eccentricities, including his high-pitched voice, numerous plastic surgeries, friendships with children, and a pet chimpanzee, earned him the nickname "Wacko Jacko." In 1993, he faced his first public child molestation allegations, which he vehemently denied. Although a jury acquitted him of all charges in a high-profile 2005 trial, the allegations severely damaged his reputation.

A U.S. tax court judge noted in 2021 that Jackson had "earned not a penny from his image and likeness in 2006, 2007, or 2008," highlighting the lasting impact of these allegations. Despite this, Jackson's popularity has surged in the digital era. According to Billboard, global consumption of his music grew from 4.7 billion to 6.5 billion on-dea 38.3% increase. In February, the BBC reported that Sony Music Group confirmed it would acquire half of Jackson's catalog in a deal valuing his music assets at more than \$1.2 billion.

Jackson's artistry continues to captivate audiences. "MJ The Musical," a jukebox show featuring his music, has enjoyed successful runs on Broadway and in London's West End. Next year, we will see the release of the Antoine Fuqua-directed biopic "Michael," starring Jackson's nephew Jaafar Jackson.

Jackson's influence extends far beyond his lifetime. His music, characterized by innovative videos. groundbreaking dance moves, and genre-defying sounds, continues to inspire artists across the globe. His humanitarian efforts and vision of healing the world are integral to his legacy.

Today, Michael Jackson's influence is seen in the work of numerous artists, from Bruno Mars to Beyoncé. His innovative approach to music and performance continues to inspire new generations. While the controversies surrounding his life may never fully dissipate, the BBC notes that Jackson's contributions to music and culture remain a significant part of his legacy.

As fans marked the fifteenth anniversary of his death, Jackson's star continues to shine brightly. His music, moves, and overall talent resonate more than ever, proving that the King of Pop's legacy is enduring and evolving.

As Jackson himself once said, "I'm just like anyone. I cut, and I bleed. And I embarrass easily."

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Kamala Harris Speaks Two Years After Roe v. Wade Is Overturned

ice President Kamala Harris recently made a stop in College Park, Md. to recognize the second anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's overturning of Roe v. Wade., a landmark case that made abortion a constitutional right.

"Over the past two years, in states across our nation, the extremists have proposed and passed laws that criminalize doctors and punish women: laws that limit access to contraception and to fertility treatments like IVF. In some cases they are trying to revive laws from the 1800s," said Harris.

According to the Center for Reproductive Rights, a non-profit organization of reproductive rights advocates and lawyers, around 14 states have made abortion illegal.

"Two years ago, Donald Trump's Supreme Court majority ripped away the fundamental freedom for women to access the health care they need and deserve. The consequences have been devastating. If given the chance, there is no question he will ban abortion nationwide, with or without the help of Congress," said Biden in a statement on June 24, acknowledging the day. "I will never let that happen. My message to Americans is this: Kamala and I are fighting like hell to get your freedom back. And we won't stop until we restore the protections of Roe v. Wade for every woman in every state."

At the gathering, Harris doubled down on Biden's

sentiments.

"In the case of the stealing of reproductive freedom from the women of America, Donald Trump is guilty," said Harris, gaining cheers from the crowd.

The lively crowd chanted "four more years" and "restore Roe" several times throughout the event.

Throughout her speech, Harris played up Trump's part in and lack of remorse for the overturning of Roe v. Wade.

"When he was in the White House, Donald Trump handpicked three members of the United States Supreme Court because he intended for them to overturn Roe v. Wade," said Harris. "As intended, they did."

There are currently six Republican-nominated justices on the U.S. Supreme Court and three Democrat-nominated justices

"This is more than just an anniversary. It's proof that we should never take for granted our liberties," said Democratic nominee for U.S Senate and Prince George's County Executive Angela Alsobrooks at the gathering. "It's the confirmation that we must be vigilant and fighting for and protecting, with everything we have, our rights.

"Electing Vice President Kamala Harris and President Biden means that we will have a country that remains recognizable to us," said Alsobrooks.

Voters' perspectives of a candidate's views on abortion surely matter as a poll by Navigator Research, a project led by pollsters, finds that 68 percent of Americans believe it is important for Biden and Congress to protect abortion access this year.

In Our Own Voice, a national partnership to uplift Reproductive justice leaders, finds that Black voters are six times more likely to vote for a candidate who supports abortion access than one who opposes it.

The poll by Navigator Research also shows that

80 percent of women are supportive of increasing access to birth control pills, 70 percent for easier access to fertility planning such as IVF, 57 percent for an abortion pill and 56 percent for in-clinic abortions.

Trump did not make any public statements on the anniversary of Roe v. Wade.

Previously Republicans have said the decision restored power to the states concerning abortion and protects the lives of unborn



children.





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Books about the Civil War

his summer, I read about a period in history when war ravaged the country, pitted brother against brother, righted a very large wrong, and left scars on the land, on people, and families.

Sometimes, history is in the details, and in "Voices from Gettysburg" by Allen C. Guelzo (Kensington, \$29.00), you'll read a day-by-day, person-by-person account of what is arguably the most influential battle of the Civil War.

Using real letters written by prisoners, soldiers, and others who

were at Gettysburg on those days in July 1863, you'll get an intimate sense of what it was like to be on the battlefield or near it. Filled with authentic voices, maps, and other documents, this is a puts-you-in-theaction kind of book that you won't be able to put down.

At some point in your lifetime, you've undoubtedly read or learned something about Harriet Tubman. In your mind, she may seem invincible, like some sort of being with superpowers, due to her bravery during the Civil War and the lives she helped ferry to freedom. In "Night"

Flyer: Harriet Tubman and the Faith Dreams of a Free People" by Tiya Miles (Penguin Press, \$30), you'll learn that some of what you think you know are myths, and that there's actually so much more to Tubman's life and actions.


It's true that Tubman helped free hundreds of people, but this book explores more, including the environment that nurtured her and the relationships she had with the women she helped, and others. We get a fresher, deeper look at the person Tubman was, allowing readers to learn more about the spiritual life that soothed her in times of trouble. That alone might offer inspiration for today's soiourners.

And finally, if you'd like a little bit of surprise with your summertime reading, reach for "Wide Awake: The Forgotten Force that Elected Lincoln and Spurred the Civil War" by Jon Grinspan (Bloomsbury, \$32).


Despite what you may think, the elections we've seen lately in this country weren't the most contentious: at the beginning of the 1860 political season, a bunch of young Northerners, both men and women, Black and white, began organizing on behalf of antislavery speakers and abolitionists. They called themselves the Wide Awakes and during the election, they became a political force to be reckoned with. It's possible, says Grinspan, that the Wide Awakes were one of the major catalysts for the War. This book packs the action in, and it'll show you that history can be full of surprises.


